A Message from Fr. Kubista:

Adoration is so named because in it we adore the Lord. It is a way that we give honor, glory, and praise to Jesus Christ who is truly presence in the Blessed Sacrament typically placed in the monstrance. Adoration is a form of prayer where we come to be with Jesus, acknowledge his greatness, and visit with him. It can be a very powerful way that we experience Christ and his love for us.

If we want our relationship with Jesus to grow, we have to spend time with him, talking and praying to him. He wants us to get to know him (to follow in his ways) for we do not want to be one who he denies entry into the Kingdom because he does not know us.(Mt 7:21-23) In any of our relationships, in order for the relationship to grow, we need to spend time with the other person.

There are many ways to spend time and sometimes it is best just to be with them. In the last months of my Father's life, I was able to spend time with him. He could no longer talk and so when I would get done talking there wasn't much else to say so I just was with him. I remember the last Thanksgiving with Father, after talking with him for a little bit, I spent time being with him, resting in the coach nearby. I wasn't "doing" anything but was just in his presence. Why do I remember this moment? There must have been something special about it or maybe it was that I just spent time with him (was near him on a special day) and looking back, it was a way of thanking him.

There is something about being in the presence of another that really makes a difference. Sure in this technological age, there are many ways to stay connected with parents, brothers, sisters, family, and friends through email and phone but there is something about actually being in their presence (being near them) that helps us grow closer to them. It is the "entire" personal experience that we miss in the other forms of communication.

Our relationship with God is similar. We can grow in our relationship with God through Creation by taking in a beautiful sunset or walking through the woods. God can speak to us in these moments but this is like talking on the phone or communicating through email. God is not present to us in person. When we come to Church and are in the presence of the Lord in the tabernacle or on the altar at Mass, we are near Jesus. We can sit with our Lord in adoration, to be in his presence (his body, blood, soul, and divinity) and there is a closeness and a level of connection that can happen which cannot happen elsewhere.

Adoration is a great way to be present with Jesus, to sit in the presence of the Master, to sit at his feet and listen, allowing the silence to permeate us, to open up our hearts to a greater relationship with him. We can ponder the mysteries in reading the Bible or spiritual works or pray the rosary and other prayers meditating on the words and on our lives as to how we can be drawn more into Jesus. We allow Jesus to influence us, to help us to be drawn closer to him, to become more united with him, and to allow him to speak to us in a greater way. Jesus wants us to come and be with him. He wants us to be in his presence and spend some time with him like the time we spend with our families and friends. Maybe Jesus is calling us to spend more time with him and to allow him to give us the "entire" personal experience of being drawn into a deeper relationship with him by being near him. Come to adoration and rest in the Lord.(Mt 11:28, Mk 6:31) God bless you.

August is the Month of the Immaculate Heart of Mary

Since the 16th century, the practice of dedicating whole months to saints or other sacred things began to take root in the popular devotions of the Catholic Church. The month of August has traditionally been dedicated to the Immaculate Heart of Mary, with the Solemnity of the Assumption celebrated at its midpoint.

The Blessed Virgin Mary is the Mother of the Lord Jesus Christ and, as such, possesses the title and identity of "Mother of God." Throughout the history of the Church, Mary has enjoyed a singular place of honor and pre-eminence among the Communion of Saints. Chosen by God to be the mother of his only begotten Son, Mary was "immaculately conceived," that is conceived in the womb of her own mother, St. Ann, without the stain of original sin and, therefore, "full of grace," as the Angel Gabriel announced when she, in turn, conceived the Lord Jesus (Luke 1:28).

Similarly, because of her unique and privileged relationship to the Lord Jesus Christ, she was assumed body and soul into heaven when her life on earth was ended. These two intimately related convictions of faith definitively proclaimed and held by the Church – the Immaculate Conception and the Assumption – understandably merit special recognition and observance by the Church, December 8 and August 15 respectively.
