#### A Message from Fr. Kubista:

Drugs are a hot topic these days. A drug is "a substance [usually chemical, typically] used as a medication...intended to affect the structure or function of the body" We are morally permitted to take a drug if it is going to assist our body, if it will maintain or improve our health.

The primary moral principle is that we should not take something that will negatively affect or do any harm to our body, in general to our person. Our body does not belong to us rather we are to be stewards and caretakers of it as St. Paul reminds us. "Do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, whom you have from God, and that you are not your own?"(1 Cor 6:19) We have an obligation to take care of our body to the best of our ability and try to do nothing that will shorten our life in any way.

Taking drugs in itself is not bad as there can be drugs that are helpful to human health. A person cannot take a drug if it will negatively affect their health and life or that of another person (for example a baby in the womb). There may be a situation where one might take a drug because the alternative of not taking it would be worse. If a drug is designed to kill someone (euthanize them or kill a person in the womb) then one cannot take it as its end to kill is evil. Some drugs provide benefit but also have side effects and so the benefits must outweigh the side-effects. One might take a drug for immediate benefits which are considered necessary even though there is risk of long term negative side effects. At times, it may be necessary to take a drug although there may be negative side effects because the result of not taking it might be worse (one might die if they do not take the drug). One should look at a number of options (including those that provide benefit with no side effects) then make the best decision on the use of a drug.

There is a lot of information available, so it is important that one investigate the various options. Our intention in taking a drug should be that we want to heal and get better, so although there could be complications either immediately or long term, we can choose to take the drug because it is the best option for us and has the least amount of risk for something to go wrong. We need to do our best to be informed, to do our research, to talk to trusted individuals, and to look at the information available to us. One does research in order to find out all that one can so that the best option (that which benefits that person's health the most) can be chosen. One should err on the side of caution in taking drugs, especially with new drugs. If one does not know enough or feels hesitant or uncomfortable, then it probably is better to err on the side of not taking a drug. It should be obvious (not questionable) whether we are to take a drug or not. When in doubt, err on the side of caution and do not take a drug. If there is another way (an alternative) to reduce pain and/or take care of some health concern that might be more "understood" then take the better option. There are various degrees of potency of drugs so the more potent the more cautious one should be in using them for medical purposes.

The Church says that certain drugs (typically psychological in nature) can inflict "very grave damage on human health and life" and their "use, except on strictly therapeutic grounds, is a grave offense." (CCC 2291) We are to avoid anything that would cause us to lose our capacity to make choices, that impairs us from choosing that which is good and right (drugs and alcohol can fall into this category).
