### A Message from Fr. Kubista:

People can underestimate the destructiveness of lying. Lying corrupts the intellect and the will in the soul, making it harder to see (understand) and speak the truth. It is never ok as we are always to think and say the truth. Speaking the truth builds up trust in others so that they know what we think or where we stand. "A trustworthy witness does not lie, but one who spouts lies makes a lying witness." (Proverbs 14:5)

Lying is knowingly thinking or saying something that is not true. Unintentionally saying something that is incorrect is not a lie. We can lie to God, ourselves, or others. A lie first starts in our intellect where we know the truth and yet we think about something that is contrary to it. We then choose (an act of the will) to continue in that thought which would be lying to ourselves or God. For example, one might think that it is ok to steal something that we need, but stealing is not right so we lie to ourselves thinking that it is ok. When we have lies within ourselves, it makes us more prone to allow the thought to turn into action. Jesus says that: "Nothing that enters one from outside can defile that person; but the things that come out from within are what defile" (Mk 7:15) When we choose to share with others what we think, we expose the lie to them.

Lying corrupts the soul as it gets our mind more familiar with thinking falsehoods and weakens our will. It clouds the mind (intellect) making it harder for us to see the truth. It confuses reality and moves the mind to figure out ways to lie and be deceptive. Lies confuse as it becomes harder to know what is true and what is not; if we think or say something enough it is more apt that we come to believe it. Lies lead to more lies which is one of the effects of sin. It can become a habit where one might not realize that they are lying. Lying moves the will to excuse itself from speaking the truth. Lying can be done out of fear as one might be afraid that the truth will be known, which might make a person look bad or get them into trouble. Having humility is a way to overcome the fear so when a mistake is made, to admit it, learn from it, and move on. Lying enslaves and weighs down a person, whereas speaking the truth sets one free.

The Bible tells of lying. The Book of Proverbs says that the Lord hates "a lying tongue" and "the false witness who utters lies" "No one who practices deceit can remain within [the Lord's] house. No one who speaks falsely can last in my presence." (Psalm 101:7) "Like a glazed finish on earthenware are smooth lips and a wicked heart. With their lips enemies pretend, but inwardly they maintain deceit; When they speak graciously, do not trust them, for seven abominations are in their hearts. The lying tongue is its owner's enemy, and the flattering mouth works ruin." (Proverbs 26:23-25,28) Jesus (speaking to the Jews) says: "You belong to your father the devil and you willingly carry out your father's desires. He was a murderer from the beginning and does not stand in truth, because there is no truth in him. When he tells a lie, he speaks in character, because he is a liar and the father of lies." (John 8:44) The devil lied to Adam and Eve (tricking them to disobey God) so the devil's character has been corrupted, he cannot speak the truth because there is none in him. Thus, Jesus confirms that lying corrupts the individual's soul and diminishes (eliminates) the truth. St Paul says: "Now the Spirit explicitly says that in the last times some will turn away from the faith by paying attention to deceitful spirits and demonic instructions through the hypocrisy of liars with branded consciences. "(1 Timothy 4:1-2)

We are to think and speak the truth and with God's help, know the Truth (God's way). God bless you.

# October is the Month of the Holy Rosary

October is designated by the Catholic Church as the "Month of the Rosary" because in this month the Church celebrates the Marian advocation of "Our Lady of the Rosary" on Oct. 7.

The feast of Our Lady of the Rosary, also celebrated as Our Lady of Victory or Victories, was established by Pope St. Pius V in 1571 to celebrate the miraculous victory of the Christian forces in the Battle of Lepanto on Oct. 7 of that year. Previous to the decisive battle, St. Pius V had requested all Western Christians to pray the rosary; thus he attributed the victory to the power of the Marian prayer rather than the power of ships and cannons.

Two years before establishing the feast, in 1569, Pope St. Pius V officially approved the rosary in its present form with the papal bull *Consueverunt Romani Pontifices* ("The Roman Pontiffs are accustomed," the first words of the document). In a development from earlier

methods of praying the rosary, the new version included the second half of the Hail Mary, as well as the "Glory Be" prayer at the end of each mystery.

The dedication of the month of October to the Holy Rosary became common in the Church thanks to Pope Leo XIII, an enthusiastic promoter of the rosary. In the span of only five years, Pope Leo wrote eleven encyclicals on the rosary. – from the Catholic News Agency
