A Message from Fr. Kubista:

When we vote (which is our duty) the most important issue for us to consider is how a candidate stands on intrinsically evil acts. We have to understand where the candidate stands by looking at what they have done in the past and what they say they will do, being aware that they might lie. We are to vote for the best candidate, the one who does not support intrinsic evil (or supports less).

Intrinsic evils are those things which are evil in their object. The object is the thing or person being acted on. For example, the object in an abortion is the innocent baby (a human person). Acts like abortion are intrinsically evil because the circumstance and intention do not matter; to kill an innocent human being is always wrong. Certainly the circumstances and intention can diminish the culpability (responsibility) of the actor, but the action is still wrong, it is intrinsically evil. Some other examples of intrinsic evils are: euthanasia, so called "gay marriage", and "gender changing".

If a candidate supports an intrinsic evil (any intrinsic evil) then we are not to vote for them. We can vote for a candidate who supports an intrinsic evil only if the other candidate supports more intrinsic evil and if there are only two electable candidates. St. Pope John Paul II says in *The Gospel of Life* (Evangelium Vitae #73) that a legislator can vote for a law which is evil but is the lesser of two evils. If the legislator does not vote for the lesser of two evils, then the result would be more evil. So applying this to voting; we are to vote for a candidate who has a chance to win and who supports less (preferably no) intrinsic evils. We must choose less evil so not voting is not an option.

We sin if we vote for a candidate who supports intrinsic evil and there is another electable candidate who does not support intrinsic evil or supports less. In electing a candidate we empower them so that if they pass evil legislation, we have in some way participated in the evil and so we are culpable (responsible) in a remote way. For example, if we gave a gun license to a known killer which enabled him to easily get a gun and then he killed somebody; having the gun license remotely assisted him in the murder. So when we elect a candidate who enacts laws which legalize (to some, legitimize) intrinsic evil acts, we are a remote accomplice in the act, we are remotely responsible, and we sin.

Abortion, so called "gay marriage", euthanasia, and "gender changing" are intrinsic evils. These issues are not just some among other issues but are top tier (non-negotiable) issues. These issues should be looked at first in the candidate and that candidate's stance on them well understood. We need to make sure we are getting our information on their stance from good sources and people that we trust. If a candidate is in favor of any of these, it really does not matter what else they stand for. We are to vote for the candidate who is not for intrinsic evil or for less of it.

If one supports intrinsic evil, it says a lot about their character. When one participates in it, their intellect and will is negatively affected, their judgment and reason is clouded, and there is a greater chance that poor (bad) decisions will be made in many areas.

God does not bless those who promote intrinsic evil. We have an obligation and duty as Christians try to prevent them from getting into office. We have to look at what they have supported in the past, what are the issues that are important to them, and ask if they God centered (do they respect and follow God). Let us seek out and vote for candidates who do not support intrinsic evil (or support less), those whom God will bless for following in His ways. God bless you.

October is the Month of the Holy Rosary

October is designated by the Catholic Church as the "Month of the Rosary" because in this month the Church celebrates the Marian advocation of "Our Lady of the Rosary" on Oct. 7.

The feast of Our Lady of the Rosary, also celebrated as Our Lady of Victory or Victories, was established by Pope St. Pius V in 1571 to celebrate the miraculous victory of the Christian forces in the Battle of Lepanto on Oct. 7 of that year. Previous to the decisive battle, St. Pius V had requested all Western Christians to pray the rosary; thus he attributed the victory to the power of the Marian prayer rather than the power of ships and cannons.

Two years before establishing the feast, in 1569, Pope St. Pius V officially approved the rosary in its present form with the papal bull *Consueverunt Romani Pontifices* ("The Roman Pontiffs are accustomed," the first words of the document). In a development from earlier methods of praying the rosary, the new version included the second half of the Hail Mary, as well as the "Glory Be" prayer at the end of each mystery.

The dedication of the month of October to the Holy Rosary became common in the Church thanks to Pope Leo XIII, an enthusiastic promoter of the rosary. In the span of only five years, Pope Leo wrote eleven encyclicals on the rosary. – from the *Catholic News*

October 7th Prayer and Fast for Peace

To mark the one-year anniversary of the Hamas attack on Israel, Pope Francis has called on Catholics to observe a day of prayer and fasting for peace on October 7. The Latin Patriarch of Jerusalem, Cardinal Pierbattista Pizzaballa has also asked the clergy and lay faithful of his diocese to observe October 7 as a day of prayer, fasting and penance. To complement these efforts, Archbishop Broglio invited the U.S. bishops to join Pope Francis, and the Christians of the Holy Land "in fervent prayer for an end to the violence, for the prompt and safe return of all hostages, and for the conversion of hearts so that hatred may be overcome, opening a pathway to reconciliation and peace."
