A Message from Fr. Kubista:

It is sad when a person (beautifully made in the image of God), commits suicide. The Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC) says: "Everyone is responsible for his life before God who has given it to him. It is God who remains the sovereign Master of life. We are obliged to accept life gratefully and preserve it for his honor and the salvation of our souls. We are stewards, not owners, of the life God has entrusted to us. It is not ours to dispose of."(CCC 2280) "Suicide contradicts the natural inclination of the human being to preserve and perpetuate his life."(CCC 2281) "It is gravely contrary to the just love of self. It likewise offends love of neighbor because it unjustly breaks the ties of solidarity with family, nation, and other human societies to which we continue to have obligations."(CCC 2281) "Suicide is the second leading cause of death among those between the ages of 10 and 34 in the U.S. (CDC). However, studies have shown that belonging to a faith community can be a protective factor against suicide."

People commit suicide for various reasons. One of them is that they think the problems in their life are too great to overcome (they lose hope), so they give up. A man who jumped off the Golden Gate Bridge and survived, said that as he was falling: "I realized then that all the problems in my life that I thought were unsolved were in fact solvable – except for having jumped." No matter what happens to us, God will help us get through it, so never lose hope. It does not mean that it will be easy. God loves us more than we know, so we must remain faithful and love Him in part by taking care of ourselves, by loving ourselves, realizing that our life is worth living. One source said that a majority of those who commit suicide are suffering from some form of depression, "either the depressive phase of bipolar disorder, major depression, or alcohol- and drug- induced depressive states." Another source said that "according to the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention, ninety percent of all people who die by suicide have a diagnosable psychiatric disorder at the time of their death." Although suicide is seriously immoral, "grave psychological disturbances, anguish, or grave fear of hardship, suffering, or torture can diminish the responsibility of the one committing suicide." (CCC 2282)

If we or someone that we know has suicidal tendencies, it is important to address them. If a suicidal thought pops into our head, to immediately pray to the Lord or one of the saints for help, and then reject it. God never allows us to be tempted beyond our capacity to avoid falling into sin, for He always gives us enough grace to say no. We can pray to God or talk to someone we trust as to why we are having the thought, what is going on inside, are we discouraged or depressed? It could be the Devil tempting us, telling us that we are no good and that our life is not worth living. It is important to stay close to the Lord by praying (including saying the rosary), go to confession regularly (which can heal us and give us hope), and going to mass every week where we are strengthened and encouraged by Jesus. In our lives, we have ups and downs, so to be vigilant so that when we are down, that we realize it and take steps to avoid or minimize the negativity that can come in those moments.

We pray for those who are suicidal, that they know how much they are loved and not lose hope, realizing that God has great plans for them. God wants them to be with Him for eternity and He will take care of them if they accept His help. "We should not despair of the eternal salvation of persons who have taken their own lives. By ways known to him alone, God can provide the opportunity for salutary repentance. The Church prays for persons who have taken their own lives." (CCC 2283) God bless you.

November—The Month of the Holy Souls

The month of November is dedicated to the Holy Souls in Purgatory. The Church commemorates all her faithful children who have departed from this life, but have not yet attained the joys of heaven. St. Paul warns us that we must not be ignorant concerning the dead, nor sorrowful, "even as others who have no hope ... For the Lord Himself shall come down from heaven ... and the dead who are in Christ shall rise.

The Church has always taught us to pray for those who have gone into eternity. Even in the Old Testament prayers and alms were offered for the souls of the dead by those who thought "well and religiously concerning the resurrection." It was believed that "they who had fallen asleep with godliness had great grace laid up for them" and that "it is therefore a holy and wholesome thought to pray for the dead, that they may be loosed from sins." We know that a defiled soul cannot enter into heaven.
