A Message from Fr. Kubista:

We are so grateful that Jesus has come to save us from death (the devil) so that we can inherit eternal life with the help of God. St Peter tells us: "Be sober and vigilant. Your opponent the devil is prowling around like a roaring lion looking for [someone] to devour. Resist him, steadfast in faith," (1 Peter 5:8-9) The devil is the primary foe of a Christian.

A group called Minnesota Satanists has sponsored a devilish display in the Minnesota State Capitol. Their website says: "We champion the symbol of Lucifer as one of revolt against arbitrary authority and advocacy for the pursuit of knowledge." It sounds a lot like how the devil tricked Adam and Eve: follow me, go against the authority of God, and pursue the knowledge of good and evil. The display is of the mythical phoenix freshly emerging from its ashes, over its head is an upside down five sided star inside a circle (the symbol of Satanism), and in front of it is a card which reads: "You Are Your Own God".

The phoenix looks like it has horns (the devil is often depicted with horns) and it is orange, red, and yellow which are the colors of fire (the unquenchable fire of Hell). A phoenix can be viewed as an image of the Resurrection as accounted by St. Clement. "Let us consider that wonderful sign [of the resurrection] which takes place in Eastern lands, that is, in Arabia and the countries round about. There is a certain bird which is called a phoenix. This is the only one of its kind, and lives five hundred years. And when the time of its dissolution draws near that it must die, it builds itself a nest of frankincense, and myrrh, and other spices, into which, when the time is fulfilled, it enters and dies. But as the flesh decays a certain kind of worm is produced, which, being nourished by the juices of the dead bird, brings forth feathers." Job says mentions the longevity of the phoenix. So the symbol of the phoenix is flipped, rather than symbolizing Christ who brings eternal life, it symbolizes the devil who brings eternal death.

The upside down star inside the circle can be viewed as turning a Christian symbol on its head. "A circle is a symbol of God's eternity." "Among Christians [a five pointed star] has symbolized the five wounds of Christ—his hands and feet punctured by the Crucifixion and his side pierced by a soldier's spear—as well as the Star of Bethlehem and Christ himself." The inverted star (pentagram) is associated with negative or "black" magic and devil worship.

Regarding the card, when Adam and Eve sinned, the devil indicated that they would become their own gods: "you will be like gods." (Genesis 3:5) Making ourselves (or anyone including Lucifer) god violates the First Commandment: I am the Lord thy God: thou shall not have strange (other) gods before me.

There is debate on whether this sort of display is protected under the First Amendment of the US Constitution. The Constitution states that Congress cannot make a law that prohibits exercising a religion including talking about that religion but it does not say that one is obligated to put up in public spaces displays for a religion especially if the display demeans another religion during one of its sacred times (Advent/Christmas). One could view the display as blasphemy as it takes things of God and turns them upside down, and it honors Satan (who mocks God) therefore the display mocks God. There is some legal precedent that blasphemy laws would apply. In an article, "Blasphemy and the Original Meaning of the First Amendment" by Harvard Law Review (Dec 2021), the conclusion is that blasphemy can be considered along with obscenity and defamation, as not protected by the First Amendment. There are states today that have blasphemy laws: Massachusetts, Michigan, Oklahoma, Wyoming, and South Carolina.

As Christians, we are to protect others from the spiritual deadly influences of the devil. We can pray (certainly for people to turn away from the devil) and ask our government leaders to remove the devilish display from our State Capitol. God bless you.
