A Message from Fr. Kubista:

Life can be hard at times, and as human beings sometimes we suffer. The definition of suffering is "pain that is caused by injury, illness, loss, etc.: physical, mental, or emotional pain" Whether it is physical, emotional, or spiritual pain, we suffer.

God did not create suffering (or death) rather it is a result of sin. God created Adam and Eve to be happy with Him but their sin fractured that relationship and corrupted God's creation. When Adam and Eve sinned, suffering entered the world, thus they (and the devil) are the source of suffering. God allows suffering in order that people can choose to love (love is a choice). We suffer at times because of our own sins. Sometimes we suffer through no fault of our own, when someone sins against us or by some circumstance out of our control. Even in this suffering, God is there; He helps us if we accept Him and gives us the strength to get through it. "No trial has come to you but what is human. God is faithful and will not let you be tried beyond your strength; but with the trial he will also provide a way out, so that you may be able to bear it." (1 Cor 10:13) God does not like to see us suffer and He understands what we are going through and so we can count on Him to help us get through it. It is important for us to pray to God, to raise our souls to Him, and seek His help.

God has suffered in the person of Jesus Christ so He has actually experienced it therefore He truly knows what it is all about. God the Father and God the Spirit are pure Spirits and as such do not experience suffering. The good angels do not suffer, only the fallen angels suffer as they experience the suffering due to the loss of God (who they were created to serve). St. Padre Pio says: "We may add with the saints that if the angels could envy us anything, it is our capacity to suffer with and for Christ. There is scarcely anything so consoling for a Guardian Angel as to be able to guide and strengthen a human being through the school of victimhood. Indeed, an angel even comforted and strengthened Christ according to the weak-ness of His humanity in the Garden of Gethsemane." In order to experience suffering, God became man (God took on a human nature in the Son, Jesus Christ) and in becoming man, entered into our world of suffering. "Therefore, since Christ suffered in the flesh, arm yourselves also with the same attitude (for whoever suffers in the flesh has broken with sin), "(1 Peter 4:1) Since Jesus became man and he experienced everything that we experience except sin, he would have experienced suffering. He would have gotten sick or have been hurt emotionally in some way and he experienced spiritual suffering, suffering in his soul just as we do in our soul. In the Agony in the Garden, he was so overwhelmed and stressed with suffering that he sweats blood. "There is a known medical condition known as hematidrosis in which a person has blood or blood pigments present in his sweat. This happens when ruptures in the skin occur that allow blood or blood pigment to move from the capillaries into the sweat glands...On the literal level, it would seem that Jesus, suffering the extreme stress of the Agony in the Garden, began to suffer from hematidrosis. On the spiritual level, this event foreshadows the shedding of his blood for us on the cross." In Jesus Christ, God experienced suffering; He knows what suffering "feels" like.

We are to make the most of our suffering and allow it to draw us closer to God, as suffering can help us realize our dependence on Him. The Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC) says that an illness [and more broadly suffering] can help a person mature so that they can see more clearly what is essential in life [to love God] and turn to it. 
