A Message from Fr. Kubista:

(Continued from last week...) The temptation to think that we are doing God's will when really we are doing our own will; filling our lives with busy things and not attending to those that we should be doing. The temptation to be angry with God, who is all good and never does any evil to us, rather He allows things to happen to us out of love and always gives us enough help to get through them. The temptation to think that we have not sinned when we actually have; we need to acknowledge our sins and come to Confession, for God is merciful and wants to forgive us. The temptation to despair or be discouraged because of a weakness that we have; maybe it is a tendency to be lazy, to anger, to lie, to view inappropriate pictures or movies, to be impure with our bodies, to abuse alcohol, etc. In all our temptations (especially in our vulnerable areas, weaknesses) it is important to acknowledge them and ask God for help.

Temptations in themselves are not wrong; it is what we do with them that matters. "We must also discern between being tempted and consenting to temptation." (CCC 2847) It is important that we really examine ourselves and when in doubt about whether we have crossed the line and sinned, assume that we have sinned. Go to Confession and tell this to the priest, tell him we are not sure if we have sinned and put it in God's hands.

To overcome temptations, it is so important first to remember that we need the grace of God to overcome any temptation. We have to remember that through His grace we will be saved and not by our own strength. Why did Adam and Eve not ask God for help before given into the devil? Why did they not stop and take a look at things? This is a good thing for us to remember, if we are in doubt about something or fearful or confused, do not do it rather inquire if it is good or bad. "Finally, discernment unmasks the lie of temptation, whose object appears to be good, a "delight to the eyes" and desirable, when in reality its fruit is death. "(CCC 2847) If we have to make a split decision, then say a pray to the Holy Spirit and do our best. "The Holy Spirit makes us discern between trials, which are necessary for the growth of the inner man, and temptation, which leads to sin and death." (CCC 2847) If we find out later that what we have done is sinful, then go to Confession and learn from the sin, realizing that we will be less accountable in this situation.

It is so important that we pray. "Such a battle and such a victory become possible only through prayer. It is by his prayer that Jesus vanquishes the tempter, both at the outset of his public mission and in the ultimate struggle of his agony." (CCC 2849) In the Our Father, we say "lead us not into temptation" or "do not allow us to take the way that leads to sin" thus imploring help from "the Spirit of discernment and strength." (CCC 2846) It also unites us to Christ's battle and his agony, urging us "to vigilance of the heart in communion with his own. Vigilance is "custody of the heart (the Holy Spirit constantly seeks to awaken us to keep watch)...In relation to the last temptation of our earthly battle; it ["lead us not into temptation"] asks for final perseverance. "Lo, I am coming like a thief! Blessed is he who is awake." "(CCC 2849)

Temptations will come our way and they are in part to test our love for God. If we really love God, we will turn to Him (especially in time of temptation) and ask for His help and grace. Without God's help, we will fall into sin. Dear Jesus, help us to follow the will of the Father in our lives, just like you, and avoid falling into sin. God bless you.

Laetare Sunday

Today is the halfway mark of the Sundays of Lent; Easter is enticingly near. This Sunday is known as *Laetare* Sunday for the first word of the Introit or Entrance Antiphon, *Laetare* (rejoice); it is a Sunday of joy, our foretaste of Easter joy. The celebrant has the option to wear rose-colored vestments. This is also the Second Scrutiny in preparation for the baptism of adults at the Easter Vigil.

This Sunday has a place apart amongst the Sundays of Lent. As in Advent we had *Gaudete* Sunday, so in Lent we have a Sunday commonly called *Laetare* Sunday. The whole week, with its wealth of liturgical significance, is intensely interesting. This Sunday *in vigesimal* is in imitation of Byzantine custom, a Sunday in honor of Our Saviour's Cross, for which reason the Station is at Holy-Cross-in-Jerusalem, a great devotional centre in Rome, especially during Passiontide. The great

part of the Mass is inspired by this choice. —Fernand Cabrol, OSB, *The Year's Liturgy: Vol I: The Seasons*
