A Message from Fr. Kubista:

We celebrate on this week what is called the Triduum. The word "triduum" entomologically comes from the Latin words "tri" (meaning "three") and "dies" (meaning "day"), or three days. It consists in the days of Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Easter Vigil (which occurs in the Evening of Holy Saturday). The Triduum is one liturgy spread over three days. Lent officially ends on Wednesday of Holy Week (the day before Holy Thursday) so the Triduum is after Lent, and finishes with the start of the Easter Season which occurs at the Easter Vigil.

The first day of Triduum is the celebration of Holy Thursday. It is the commemoration of the Last Supper (which occurred on Thursday April 2nd, 33AD). It is a regular mass except that at the end, the consecrated hosts are processed to the side altar to the tabernacle of repose and the main tabernacle is left empty. The main sanctuary light (red glass candle) is extinguished and a temporary one is placed on the altar of repose. The main altar (which "represents Christ") is stripped and "reminds us how He was stripped of his garments when He fell into the hands of the Jews and was exposed naked to their insults." The faithful are encouraged to spend some time, after the Holy Thursday Mass, to pray with the Lord, similar to what Jesus desired of his disciples, to pray with him for a while during his Agony in the Garden. Hopefully we do not fall asleep while praying, like Peter, James, and John.

The second day is the Good Friday Service. The priest enters and then lies down in front of the main altar for a short while and then goes to his chair. Then there is a First Reading, the Responsorial Psalm, a Second Reading, the Gospel (which is the reading of the Passion according to John), a homily, a collection for the Holy Land, and then around ten Solemn Intercessions. Then there is Veneration of the Cross where all present come up and do some sort of veneration (touch, genuflect, etc) of the cross. Then Holy Communion is distributed (there is no consecration as enough hosts are consecrated on Holy Thursday) and then all are to depart in silence.

The last day is the Easter Vigil (which occurs on Holy Saturday) and is the "king" of all liturgies. It starts off with the celebration of light, where the paschal candle is blessed, all people have their own candles lit from it, and then the Exultet is sung (which is "the hymn in praise of the paschal candle") Then anywhere from three to seven (the Pastors discretion) readings are read and Responsorial Psalms are sung, there is another reading, then the Gospel, and a homily is given. Then there can be a Baptism(s) and/or Confirmation(s) and then all people renew their baptismal promises and are sprinkled with Holy Water. Then Offertory occurs and things continue as a normal Mass. If someone has been baptized and/or confirmed, they will have become new members of God's Church, and so they will receive communion for the first time (during communion time).

The Triduum is a great way to be a part of the events of Jesus' Passion, Death, and Resurrection. It really is a great way to enter into the Easter Season. If one has not lived up the one's Lenten commitments or disciplines, maybe try to go to the entire Triduum as a way to "make up" for the deficiencies during Lent. Participating in the Triduum is something that we can sacrifice for, to give God some extra time, and be a part of this most sacred and holy time. Jesus did so much for us (especially in the events that occur during the Triduum) so to give him some extra time in this way, it a great way to show him how much we love him and are grateful for what he has done for us. Holy Week is the most important week in Catholicism. This week of great reverence and reflection spans the final eight days of Jesus' life—from Palm Sunday to Easter Sunday. It is astounding how much wisdom, insight and inspiration are available to us during this one week. Here is just a sample of what happens during Holy Week:

- Palm Sunday, Jesus triumphantly enters Jerusalem
- Monday of Holy Week, Jesus clears out the temple with a whip
- Tuesday of Holy Week, Jesus is anointed with oil at Bethany and preaches on the Mount of Olives
- Spy Wednesday, Jesus is betrayed by Judas
- Holy Thursday, Jesus celebrates the Last Supper, prays in the Garden of Gethsemane, and is arrested
- Good Friday, Jesus is sentenced to death, scourged, beaten, crucified, and dies on the Cross
- Holy Saturday, Jesus is buried in the tomb and descends into hell
- Easter Sunday, Jesus rises from the dead
